Further, the number of students who have appeared for the examination have also been listed in the table.

The result has been discussed in the tabular layout in regards to the marks secured pattern of students' examination results. The percentage approach has been considered to analyze the result where the number of students has been categorically listed among three groups. The students' performance as a percentage number of students has been highlighted among the same three groups.

The result analysis key highlights are:

1) In the course of B.Com (Hons.), 137, 181 and 178 students have enrolled for examination in first, second and third year respectively in the academic year 2021-22.
2) The $100 \%$ students have secured in the range $60-100 \%$ in the following subjects: Media Communication and Skills, Obesity Management, Academic Writing and Composition, Personal Tax Planning, E-Commerce, Human Resource Management, Income Tax Law \& Practices, Organizational Behaviours, Business Statistics and Financial Management

Further, the number of students who have appeared for the examination have also been listed in the table.

The result has been discussed in the tabular layout in regards to the marks secured pattern of students' examination results. The percentage approach has been considered to analyze the result where the number of students has been categorically listed among three groups. The students' performance as a percentage number of students has been highlighted among the same three groups.

The result analysis key highlights are:

1) For the subjects of Physics, respective students have enrolled for examination in first, second and third year respectively in the academic year 2021-22.
2) The $100 \%$ students have been secured in the range $60-100 \%$ in the following subjects: Electricity and Magnetism(sem 1), Waves and Optics, Electrical Circuit and Network Skills, Electronic Instrumentation, Basic Instrumentation Skills, and Mechanics and Discrete Mathematics.
3) The subjects namely: Electricity and Magnetism (sem 2), and Photonic Devices and Power Electronic showed below average performance of students as majority scored in the range $0-50 \%$. In order to improve the further marks, remedial sessions have been scheduled for the students.
4) The students' academic performance has been better in semester V than the other semesters.
